Welcome to our Spring Newsletter of 2021. A lot has happened in the last year but Kincardine and Deeside Befriending has continued to facilitate befriending matches with many older people across Kincardine, Mearns and Deeside throughout the pandemic. Thank you to everyone who has made this possible.

March 2020 saw an abrupt pausing of face-to-face befriending visits as the initial lockdown of the COVID pandemic started. There was a flurry of work to adjust to telephone contacts for our matches and homeworking for the staff team to keep everyone safe. This was a challenging time for all but we managed to safely transition to a model of telephone support thanks to the commitment and flexibility of our volunteers, both befrienders and trustees, as well as the staff team. It was great to be able to carry on making new matches during this time too, and telephone calls became a highlight in the week for many.

A short period in August/ September saw some matches managing to meet up in gardens or outside spaces with some fine weather helping to make this possible.

But by the end of 2020, we were back into tighter restrictions again. We know this has been hard for some matches where telephone calls are difficult but many of you have found new ways to stay in touch whilst staying safe, and without your cooperation and flexibility, we would not have managed to keep our matches going. There have been many acts of kindness to help make our befriendees feel remembered. Thank you so very much.

As we move into 2021, we hope for gradual lifting of some restrictions and that the vaccines will help to offer protection. We will continue to work in such a way as to keep everyone safe and hope we will eventually be able to see the resumption of precious face to face befriending visits.

When introduced to the Befriender's, it was a very welcome and much-loved service in which both mum and dad benefitted.

Having been introduced to Julie initially and then Lesley, mum had the opportunity to have female company and enjoy drives in the country. She would come home happy, saying how much she enjoyed the trip out and the company. She did not always remember what she did or where she went but it was always a pleasant experience. During this time dad was able to relax and have a restful nap.

The kindness of these ladies ensured that mum did not miss out on the things in life that made her happy.

Since the beginning of the lockdown, essential activities that mum attended such as a local club have stopped. With mum no longer having these social interactions, she has become more isolated and cut off from the outside world. Dad has no longer been able to have that nap as he is conscious of mum maybe going outside and falling.

We are hoping that the restrictions will ease by summer so that they can both enjoy the countryside and days out and that our beloved befriender ladies will bring sunshine back into their lives.
